

FOREST FIRE REPORTS REQUESTED BY RANGER

Persons observing smoke or fire along the Columbia River highway from Sandy to Hood River in the Hood national forest are requested to call Columbia Gorge ranger station at Herman creek, District Ranger Roy Weeman announced this week.

Toll charge where long distance telephoning is necessary

will be paid by the forest service, Weeman said. Calls should be made collect. This does not apply to fires on the Washington side of the river.

NEW DISTRICT RANGER

Roy L. Weeman took over the duties of district ranger at Columbia Gorge station at Herman creek last week when A. I. Wang, former district ranger, received his expected transfer to the Chelan forest supervisor's office at Okanogan, Wash.

Wang, who requested transfer to a dryer climate for the health of his small son, spent the last few days before his departure in showing Weeman around the district.

Weeman was stationed since 1926 at Stehekin ranger station, at the head of 60-mile-long Lake Chelan on the eastern side of the Cascade range in Washington.

A small brush fire, probably started by a cigarette thrown from a passing car, was put out by forest service men Saturday, half mile east of Multnomah falls. Fire in a sawdust pile at Cascade Locks Monday morning occupied the attention of several forest service men, the Herman creek pumper and 6 CCC boys from Camp Benson.

Walter Mehr and Wilbur Harrison are two new men on road and trail maintenance.

Weeman, Wang and Mohr report from six to 12 feet of snow at Latourelle prairie near Larch mountain with eight feet on the level, after a reconnaissance Saturday. From four to eight feet of snow covers the forest from Mill pond on the east end to Larch mountain.

Fire permits will be necessary to burn slashings or rubbish after May 15. Neither cigarettes nor matches may be thrown from cars on the highway or side roads after that date, under penalty of a heavy fine. Campfire permits will not be required until later.

Burl Smith, new protective assistant, has been posting forest service signs along the highway.

EAGLE CREEK

Three hundred picnickers registered at Eagle creek Sunday, and at least an additional 500 made use of the famous campground the same day, according to J. D. Morris, protective assistant now in charge of the grounds, in the absence of Ranger Albert Weisendanger, expected to take up residence within a few days.
