LOCKS RAISES FUNDS FOR FESTIVAL FLOAT

Plans for the float to represent Cascade Locks at Portland's Rose Festival the first week of June are being sketched following last Thursday's chamber of commerce decision to sponsor the fund-raising campaign.

Believing the campaign should begin at home, the 20 members present subscribed \$53 among themselves before they left the meeting. J. B. Labor led the parade by laying down \$10 as the first donation toward the campaign.

Festival Float Chairman Ira Owen, in complete charge of the selling campaign, told members that Festival authorities in Portland will send buttons free to be sold for \$1 each, all proceeds to be used for constructing and running the float in the floral parade. Buttons entitle the wearer to grandstand seats, admission to all events. The chamber plans to attach a "Cascade Locks" streamer to each of the 250 adult and 50 children's buttons it has ordered. Children's buttons will be sold for 25 cents.

DRIVER'S LICENSE TEST SCHEDULED FOR TODAY

State examinations for motor vehicle operators' and chauffeurs' licenses will be given May 16, between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. on the reservation library.

All licenses to drive motor vehicles in Oregon expire June 30. Renewals will be issued without examination except in special cases. Applicants for original licenses must take a thorough test on physical condition, knowledge of motor vehicle law and actual ability to drive a car.

Licenses are issued for two years. During the present period 353,521 tickets were issued, with approximately 425,000 expected for the next two years. Licenses cannot be used until June 15, but application blanks will be available this week throughout the state.
