CONGRESS MAY MAKE BONNEVILLE ITS CHILD

After a year and a half's actual work on Bonneville dam, the project is finally to be authorized by act of congress.

This was revealed last week when Senator McNary offered an amendment to the rivers and harbors bill to authorize the work. The move was regarded as a precautionary measure, an anchor to windward, in case PWA funds, now financing the project, should fail.

Under the statutes, river projects must be authorized by act of congress and have the approval of army engineers. Bonneville was approved by engineers but materialized under an executive order and not a congressional act. If the McNary amendment is accepted, Bonneville becomes a project authorized by congress for which congress can make necessary appropriations to carry on the work should PWA be unable to furnish the necessary money.

BONNEVILLE SEES OPENING OF NEW SERVICE STATION

Paul Flegel and Jim Rich, former Portlanders, have leased the new Richfield service station at Bonneville opposite the reservation entrance.

TROUTDALE MAN FINED \$5 FOR NOT QUENCHING FIRE

Jack Flynn, Troutdale, worker on a state highway crew, was fined \$5 and \$2.50 costs in Hood River county court when the fire he had built to warm some coffee flared up early Thursday morning after he thought he had put it out.

The fire covered an area of 50 to 60 feet a half mile east of Ruckel creek near the Columbia river highway. A pumper from Columbia Gorge ranger station poured 1600 gallons on the flames. Forestry service men succeeded in putting out the fire after five hours' work. Ten CCC boys from Benson camp arrived after the fire was under control, were sent back to camp.

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
