

Highway Work Moving Rapidly

With the moving of poles and wires begun this week by West Coast Power company, work of revamping the Columbia river highway through Cascade Locks progresses rapidly towards its completion within two months.

Cutting the shoulder off the hill at the east end of the business district is finished, a power shovel digging the dirt, a fleet of truck dumping it on the other side of the highway to widen the right-of-way to the specified 80 feet, and to raise the grade in front of Cascade Locks Lumber company. Excavations for right-of-way have been completed from the state highway maintenance station to near Eric Erickson's Rapids club.

Concrete work, except for the curbs on either side of the road, is nearly finished, as workers are now installing several catch basins to collect water for drainage. The curbs, to extend through the business district to the high school, will probably be laid down next month.

The present 16-foot highway will be widened 12 feet on either side, providing a straightened Main street for Cascade Locks, filled-in in front of Cascade Locks Lumber company to eliminate the dip and turn in the present road. For the greater part of its length of .91 mile, according to Frank Walters, resident state engineer supervising the job, the new highway will follow the general line of the present road. New black-top surfacing will be laid on top of the old highway sufficiently deep to make an even grade and to give the section a uniform crown.

GROUP OUTLINES NEW AUDITORIUM POLICIES

The assembly hall will be rented for dances or social gatherings for \$15, but no admission may be charged except by the Recreation association, official overseers of the building. For such as church, lodge meeting, athletics and other community activities no charge will be made. No political nor labor meetings, nor commercial moving pictures will be permitted. Arrangements for use of any part of the building must be made with the publicity director in the new administration building.

Work Starts On Highway Bridge At Eagle Creek

With H. M. Teel, resident engineer, on the ground, work of excavating for the piers of the new state highway bridge at Eagle creek has been actively started by the contractor, who is employing a crew of eight or 10 men.

The bridge, modeled after the beautiful McLoughlin memorial bridge at Oregon City, will be 464 feet long, 26 feet wide between curbs, with 3½ foot walks on either side. It will cost the state more than \$75,000.

Contract for the super-structure will not be let until early autumn, but the state expects to select the contractor prior to the time the piers are ready to carry the steel in October. Contract for cement work provides that the first two of the four piers must be finished by August 1.

The new bridge is located between the present highway bridge and the new railroad bridge. It will carry the highway across a right-of-way north of the Eagle creek tavern. East of the tavern the highway will pass through the heavy cut which the army engineers are making to carry the Union Pacific railroad line over a new grade; west of the bridge the highway will enter a tunnel and pass under Tooth rock.
