Bell Hill will receive the federal jury's judgment of \$72,500 for her property overlooking the Bonneville damsite and condemned as part of the project, it appeared this week when the government's motion for an additional 30 days in which to file a bill of exceptions was denied by Federal Judge McNary. The first 30-day period had expired.

Mrs. Bell will receive interest at 6 per cent on the \$72,500 from the day the property was condemned, February 9, 1934, to day of payment. How soon the federal government will pay the judgment is not known.

BIDDER ON TURBINES

The General Electric company, Schenectady, N. Y., was low bidder for furnishing and installing two of the main turbines for the Bonneville dam powerhouse when proposals were opened in Portland Friday by Major Charles F. Williams, engineer in charge of the second district. Bid was \$1,144,880.

Second lowest was Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing company, East Pittsburgh, Penn., at \$1,181,700. Highest of the three was the \$1,191,488 bid by Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing company of Milwaukee.

Each generator is to be of 43,200 kilowatt capacity. Cost of transporting the huge units from the factory will be borne by the U. S. engineers.
