OPUC SETTLES POWER DIFFICULTY AT LOCKS

Ten houses in W. C. Andersen's Hyde Park addition, Cascade Locks, will be wired for electricity the first of next week as result of conference Wednesday between Andersen and West Coast Power company, represented by C. P. Elliot, district engineer, and T. A. Bayless, local superintendent.

George Swartz, Oregon public utilities commission engineer, was arbitrator, following protests to OPUC by Andersen and his tenants that the power company was estimating too much, in the form of a loan from the prospective consumers, for constructing the needed extensions. A satisfactory agreement ending a misunderstanding was reached with consent of Mr. Swartz. The power company will string high voltage wires to a transformer to be installed in the addition.

ADDITION TO SCHOOL NEARING COMPLETION

Bonneville school gymnasium and auditorium, under construction since November 15, is nearing completion this week with the raising of beams for the roof.

The building, approximately 70 by 40 feet in size, will be finished sometime this summer, probably in June, according to C. A. Robertson, school principal. Work is being done without cost to the district by the SERA, the district furnishing materials for which an issue of \$2700 in bonds was floated last winter.

When finished, the \$4000 building will provide a modern auditorium and gymnasium with two dressing rooms, a stage and a heating plant. No shower or locker rooms are included.
