ENGINEERS OK PLANS FOR LADDERS, LOCKS

Plans for four fish ladders, largest ever constructed, fish locks and passages for Bonneville dam were approved Monday by U. S. engineers at an estimated cost of \$3,200,000. Recommendation of an additional expenditure of \$1,180,000 for enlargement of the plans was turned down when engineers called them experimental, said they could be installed after completion of the dam if found necessary.

Elaborate passages for fingerling salmon will be built on each end of the spillway dam and at the powerhouse. The four ladders will be located, one on each side of the main channel, one at the north end of the powerhouse, one between Tanner creek and Bradford slough, complete with collecting traps and two double fish locks, one on the Washington shore and one at the south end of the powerhouse.

The ladders will be 40 feet wide, the locks, 20x30 feet.
