Straw Wine Is So Named From Its Drying Mats

Paris.—Straw wine is not a synthetic drink derived from horse food, but an authoritative, amber-colored wine which owes its name to the manner in which the grapes are "cured." Straw wine comes from the mountainous Jura region, and has been produced by the same methods since 1764. The grapes are so delicate that no one is allowed in the vineyard after July, as the slightest contact withers them. Harvesting begins long after other wines have been pressed. The grape clusters are left on straw mats to dry. Hence the name.

ENGINEERS SAY RIVER NEAR TOP OF SPRING RISE, DUE NEXT WEEK

Army engineers are laughing at rumors that the Columbia has reached the top of its flood and is on the down grade, but admit that it will fall short of the height predicted several months ago.

The engineers are breathing a bit easier than they were a few weeks ago when it was thought that the crest of the freshet might bring water lapping over the Union Pacific's main line past the dam and over the top of the dirt cofferdam above the powerhouse closing of Bradford slough.

They were prepared to raise the railroad tracks on short notice, had raised the cofferdam to the height of the tracks, 55 feet above sea level, in anticipation of a flood of 700,000 second feet. Now they expect but slightly over 600,000 second feet, a rise of about six feet above present levels.

Cool weather in the basins of the Columbia and Snake rivers is allowing streams to run off snow waters more evenly. Instead of the usual hot spell bringing the melting snow downstream in a rush to pile up a high peak crest, passed in a few days.

The crest of the flood will arrive by the end of June, is the engineer's official prediction, despite continued cool weather. Only one flood peak has been recorded after that time, in 1889, when it fell on July 3. In 1916, the coldest year the basin has

ever experienced, according to records, the peak passed Bonneville on June 30 and July 1. The sun reaches its greatest height of the year June 21, shines longer than on any other day, hence usually melts the bulk of the snow that day or previous to it.

The Snake river is now thought by engineers and the weather bureau to have reached its crest on May 24 and 25, dropping slightly to level off for several weeks. Accounting for approximately one-fourth of the Columbia's freshet runoff, it is still an important actor since its volume of flow remains high and steady.

Only the completely unexpected and unusual phenomenon of extreme high temperatures in the upper country, followed immediately by heavy, drenching rains, could cause the river to rise to the top of the upper Bradford cofferdam, engineers say.

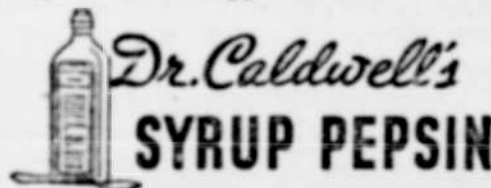
