CREWS AT WORK AFTER CABLE BREAK

Bonneville dam employees went back to work last Wednesday, the break in the submarine cable carrying power under the river from North Bonneville to Bradford island repaired.

Columbia Construction company and General-Snea company crews assisted Northwestern Electric company in stringing the three 11,000 volt aluminum power wires across the main channel on poles, high water preventing fixing the cable on the bottom. The completed job was done in what is described as record time for an undertaking of its magnitude.

Span between the poles on either side of the channel is 1325 feet. The government tug Bonneville assisted in drawing the wires across. Salvage of the submarine cable will be undertaken after the peak of the June freshet is past. Break was believed to have been caused by the swift current, running 12 miles an hour, rolling boulders across the line.

POWERHOUSE TURBINE WORK BEGINS IN FALL

General Electric company will start building the two 43,200 kilowatt capacity main generators for the powerhouse before September 1, at its Schenectady plant, company officials announced last week.

The company was low bidder at \$1,144,880 for the generators when bids were opened the end of May. Cost of transporting the huge units to the powerhouse will be borne by the government.

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
