LOCKS POSTOFFICE TO OFFER SAVINGS BONDS

United States government "baby bonds" will go on sale at the Cascade Locks postoffice after July 1, when the office advances to a third-class rating.

The bonds are issued in denominations of \$25, \$50, \$100, \$500 and \$1000, to mature in 10 years. Sale price is on a discount basis, the bonds bearing no interest coupons. Price of \$25 bonds is now \$18.75. If the bearer holds the bond until its maturity in 1945, he will receive the principal amount, a one-third increase in his capital.

MIDWEST FIRM GIVEN DAM GENERATOR

Electric Machine Manufacturing company, Minneapolis, Minn., was low bidder for furnishing and installing 4000-kilowatt alternating current generator in the Bonneville dam powerhouse when 8 engineers opened bids in Portland last week. Bid was \$1,000,000.

Other bidders were: General Electric company, Schenectady, \$1,090,000; Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing company, Milwaukee, \$1,060,000; Westinghouse Electric & Manufacturing company, Pittsburgh, Penn., \$1,030,000. Engineer will pay the cost of transport from factory to the dam.
