SMALL FIRE MENACES LOCKS TUESDAY NIGHT

Fire, probably caused by a firecracker or a cigaret, worried Cascade Locks residents Tuesday evening when it flared up in heavy underbrush and second-growth timber on the hill east of the Anderson addition.

Crews of forest service men, aided by 10 CCC boys from Wyeth and 20 from Benson camp, put the fire out by 1 a.m. Wednesday, although the area was under guard all night. Three tanks of water were used on the blaze by the pump truck.
