Locks to Form Volunteer Fire Brigade Friday

Immediate organization of a Cascade Locks volunteer fire department will be sought Friday night when Locks business men and property owners will meet at 8 o'clock in Odd Fellows hall. A fire chief and skeleton crew of "smoke eaters" is expected to be chosen and plans arranged for their training under competent hands.

Ed Trimble was appointed Tuesday by the Commercial club to contact all Locks business men and property owners to be present at the meeting. Every club, lodge and group has been stressing the need for fire protection in town pending formation of a city government, but this is the first active step in its direction.

It is expected that the first move will be to organize a bucket brigade of 25 to 50 men. Cost of such a unit is small, its effectiveness great. A portable pump with 800 feet of hose can be obtained in emergencies. For its use, sump holes from which it may suck water, must be dug in several places where small streams run through town.

A representative of the Hood River fire department, noted as being one of the state's finest volunteer organizations, is being asked by Carl Epping, Commercial club president, to give his advice at Friday's meeting.

CHAUFFEUR PLANS TO CONTEST SUIT OF HEIRESS WIFE

Wealthy Howard de Walden Cooke of Chevy Chase, Maryland, Washington's most exclusive suburb, secured the services of George Staunton Scarlett as chauffeur. Scarlett is a handsome lad in his early twenties.

The Cooke girls, Jane, eighteen, and Anne, twenty-one, were educated at fashionable schools, but never were they permitted to have engagements with boys or young men.

Happy With Aunt.

Fun-loving and eager for more freedom, such as other girls enjoyed, the only time they secured it was upon visits to their mother's sister, Mrs. John Madigan, in Washington.

Then came an evening when it was discovered that Jane, Anne, young Scarlett, the girl's two dogs and Jane's car had disappeared, along with a quantity of wine, jewels and money.

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Commercialites, Eagles Plan to Fete Paving End

The contractor on the highway job has been hustling along in an effort to finish the paving and sidewalks through Cascade Locks prior to August 1, but it is generally believed that the work will not actually be turned over to the state much before the middle of the month.

West of the toll bridge the state is building the first section of the new road between Cascade Locks and Bonneville. This contract will be in full swing and visitors in the district for a day will have an opportunity to observe and learn what is transpiring in the mid-Columbia section, where the government is spending millions of dollars.
