**ENGINEERS CUT FOUR MONTHS OFF CLOSING RIVER TO NAVIGATION**

Cutting down on the time that navigation past Bonneville will be interrupted by the work on the dam, U. S. engineers last week announced shortening by four months of the closed periods made public in June.

Under the new schedule, traffic will be halted from December 1, 1935 until January 1, 1936, and also from January 15, 1937, until April 5, 1937. High water from May to July next summer is expected by army engineers to halt traffic.

After installation of temporary lock operating equipment about January 1, 1936, navigation will be passed through the lock by a temporary passage, 45 feet wide through the upper sill and 76 feet wide through the lower sill. About January 15, the lock will be closed for three months while the upper sill is being raised.

The above dates, according to the notice, are only approximate, depending on contractors' progress and other conditions beyond forecast now.

**HUGE AREA IN OREGON RUINED BY FIRE EACH YEAR, SAYS FORESTER**

A strip of land six miles wide and long enough to cover 50 miles from Portland to Salem, represents the average size of the area devastated each year by forest fires in Oregon, according to associate forester F. H. Brundage of the U. S. Forest Service.

Brundage showed what a appalling loss from fires each year means to the sportsman, the recreationist, the lover of birds and wild life. "Thousands of acres of recreational paradise have been turned into blackened wastes of snags and fireweed," he said, "repelling eastern tourists who are willing to pay for enjoyment of this beautiful country."

Brundage stressed the fact that half the land of Oregon cannot grow any other crop than timber and that so long as timber lasts, roughly half the population will prosper. "The main roots of our economic tree," he stated, "are two in number—agriculture and timber. If we burn our timber and our logged-off land so it cannot grow a second crop, one of our economic roots will eventually die and with it will die the tree branches which are the trades, professions and business depending on timber payrolls."

"The annual toll from fires will not be reduced," Brundage said, "until you as a citizen help to create a public opinion so strong that it will not be pleasant or 'healthy' for anybody in Oregon to be careless with fire in the woods."

**PACIFIC BIDS LOW ON LOCK EQUIPMENT JOB**

Pacific Coast Steel corporation of San Francisco was low bidder for Bonneville dam lock operating equipment when proposals were opened Friday. Its bid was \$398,298.21 delivered at the dam.

Other bids were Columbia Steel company, San Francisco, \$398,852 at the plant, \$428,858 delivered; Independent Bridge company, Pittsburgh, \$435,000 at factory; Pacific Car and Foundry company, Tacoma, \$508,990 at factory, \$513,816 delivered.
