**CHILDREN ARE
FAST LEARNING
HOW TO SWIM**

More than 50 Cascade Locks children are learning to swim Monday and Friday mornings at the ferry landing beach, east of the railroad station, under sponsorship of the Hood River chapter of the American Red Cross.

Thomas Johnson, expert swimmer and diver, is instructor. He is assisted by Clara Koberg. Both are from Hood River. Johnson is a licensed Red Cross Examiner, highest civilian rating conferred by the organization.

The present Cascade Locks beach is an extremely poor place to swim, according to Johnson. The boom logs form a big temptation for children to run along them, he said, resulting in skinned shins, with possibilities of more serious accidents. There is no shelving beach, almost a necessity for teaching beginners to swim. He said the town should either find another beach or improve the present beach.

Instructor Johnson divides the children into three groups, beginners, swimmers and lifesavers. Beginners are taught the rudiments of swimming, how to float, how to use simple strokes. Those who already swim are being taught the American crawl, the sidestroke and breast stroke. In the small lifesaving class, members are shown how to save drowning persons, how to apply artificial respiration.

Swimming classes are held from 2 a. m. to 12 noon each Monday and Friday. Last class will be August 16. The next day, Saturday, Cascade Locks children will be taken to Hood River to compete in a swimming field day. They will be given their Red Cross buttons.

**ENGINEERS CALL
BIDS AGAIN ON
CHANNEL WORK**

U. S. engineers' second call for bids on deepening and widening the Columbia river from Celilo to Umatilla was opened late yesterday in Portland.

Bids opened July 19 were all rejected because they were far above the government's estimate. Engineers had allotted \$400,000 for the work. Lowest bid was \$529,500, 40 per cent above what they would spend.

The job involves deepening the channel to give seven feet of water at the river's low stages, except for Devil's Bend rapids, near Wallula, where low water depth will be five feet. The channel will be 150 feet wide. Engineers estimate that a maximum of 31,600 yards of rock and 73,000 yards of gravel will have to be removed. Work must be finished 450 days after the order is given to proceed.

When channel work is finished sometime in 1937, river steamers will be able to run up to Umatilla, once a leading river port, bringing out grain, taking up gasoline and general cargo.
