

DRIVER UNHURT WHEN TRUCK PILES IN DITCH

Twelve tons of fresh fruit and vegetables bound for eastern Oregon points were nearly a total loss last Wednesday night when a truck owned by Veltman Produce company took to the ditch near the gravel pit west of the toll bridge. The driver escaped with a few scratches.

Steering gear was reported to have locked, causing the truck to plow through a highway fence to land in the brush 10 or 12 feet below. The truck was badly damaged. The trailer, carrying the produce in refrigeration, was dented slightly.

THREE LOCKS YOUTHS RESCUED FROM RIVER

"Never again!" That's what three Cascade Locks youngsters will tell you if you ask them if they want to go for a boat ride on the Columbia. They're cured of all sea-going ambitions as the result of spending the night on a motorboat with a dead engine at the head of the feared Cascades.

Bud Potts, 14, Jackie Douville, 13, and Wilbur Glazier, 9, started out across the river towards Stevenson one evening last week in Jess Glazier's launch, without his knowledge or permission. The boat's motor stopped in midchannel and the launch started drifting speedily downstream to where the Columbia boils over Cascade rapids.

Young Douville had presence of mind to throw overboard the anchor which held the boat just at the head of the rapids.

State police summoned by anxious parents searched all night for the boys. Henry Rosenback and Jess Glazier in Rosenback's speedboat finally discovered the lost craft and its crew at 4 a. m. after an all-night search. Parents were so glad to see the trio that none of them were reported to have been paddled for the escapade.

told the planning commissions of Oregon and Washington that the power could be sold at the switch for 1½ mills per kilowatt hour. Bohn is believed to be prepared to pay slightly more than one mill.

The Bohn offer was tendered to the war department last spring. It has never been acted upon. With Bohn in Portland and the chamber of commerce excited over prospect of obtaining a major industry early action may be anticipated.

The Bohn people have located a deposit of alunite ore in Utah. They want to ship it to Bonneville, work it up here. Failing in their efforts to obtain alunite ore from the Intermountain country they would import ore in ballast. That is the reason they are asking for a 35-foot channel up the river.

Plans for developing the deep channel are being carried forward now by the war department. Army engineers have recommended a 28-foot channel.

Proposed site of the mammoth aluminum plant at Dodson would embrace land running from the river back up into the hills. It would include the farm occupied by Joe Bucher's Hollywood dairy. No objections are raised to the rough ground because the gulches would provide dumping ground for waste.

At Bonneville Friday Bohn said he and his people planned a modern industrial city. They would promote the townsite, sell lots.

ACCIDENTAL SHOT HITS LOCKS YOUTH IN ARM

Dick Potts, young son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Potts of Cascade Locks, is going to be more careful with his shootin' irons after this. Today he wears his right arm in a sling, a bandage concealing a bullet wound in his wrist.

Thursday young Potts was plugging away at birds down on the river bank east of the fox farm. One bird flew before he had a chance to fire. He lowered the .22 calibre rifle to watch the bird. The rifle went off. Potts reached in his pocket for another shell, noticed that his right hand was a bit sticky, glanced down to see two small holes on the inside of his wrist.

He felt no pain but, realizing what had happened, ran towards home. Mrs. Nicholson, who lives back of Shirley Moore's garage, bathed the wound with antiseptic, applied a tourniquet, although the bleeding was slight. Then J. Martinsen drove Potts to Bonneville, where Dr. R. L. Baker, reservation physician, bandaged it up.

Damage was slight, according to U. S. engineers, a little patching being all that is necessary to make repairs. The rock came from Tooth rock at a spot where blasting is necessary anyway to prepare for the 100-foot barrel extension ordered by U. S. engineers.
