St. Paul Firm Gets River Job

Siems-Helmars, Inc., of St. Paul, Minn., was last week awarded the contract for widening and deepening the Columbia river from Cello falls to Umatilla on a low bid of \$346,520.

Second lowest bid was \$347,925 by General Construction company of Seattle. Engineers estimated \$331,925 for the job.

This was the third time that bids had been called by U. S. engineers. First time, the lowest bid was 40 per cent above the \$400,000 allotted the job. Second time, the low bidder was slightly below the allotment, but not low enough to allow U. S. engineers to have their necessary share for administrative expenses. Quantities of material to be removed from the channel were reduced, principally by elimination of Devil's Bend rapids from the list of rapids through which a seven-foot channel 150 feet wide was to be driven.

The project now involves removal of 31,000 yards of rock, 73,000 yards of gravel. New specifications on the third bidding call for a more thorough improvement. The contractor must start within 30 days after notice to proceed is given, must complete the work within 450 days.
