40 MEN BEGIN IMPROVEMENTS ON EAGLE CREEK

"The men are proving themselves to be far better than we expected," Wiesendanger declared. "They're mostly younger fellows with a desire to work and they are now gaining weight and having a good time."

The crew may stay all winter and perhaps for a year to complete all work on the job list.
