DREDGING LOCKS CANAL STARTS SEPTEMBER 3

Dredging the high water accumulation of silt from the locks canal at Cascade Locks will start September 3, C. A. Saunders, in charge of the locks, said yesterday.

Eight extra men will be employed on the U. S. engineers' dredge, which is stationed permanently at the locks. The work, done every year after the Columbia river drops from its spring freshet, will take a month. Quantity of silt to be removed is yet to be determined by taking soundings.

TEST HOLE BIDS HIGH ARMY TO READVERTISE

Bids for drilling 206 test holes in the Columbia river between Vancouver and Bonneville, opened last week in Portland, will be re-advertised, Col. Thomas M. Robins, division engineer, announced.

U. S. engineers estimated \$8,566 for the job. Lowest bid was \$10,303.50, submitted by R. S. McClintock of Spokane, Wash. The drilling is preliminary to widening and deepening the channel to carry ocean shipping to Bonneville.

MEDDLER SHUTS OFF BONNY VILLA WATER

Water in the Enquist addition at Bonny Villa was temporarily cut off Thursday night when someone turned the valves below the reservoirs, causing one to empty.

One tank is 50 feet higher than the other, according to Rolph Enquist of Bonny Villa tavern. The valves keep water from the upper tank from coming down and overflowing the other. Enquist is requesting that all valve-turning be left to him so further inconvenience will not occur.

LIONEL HAMPTON TO PLAY MONDAY DANCE

Lionel Hampton, who has won the title from critics as "the world's fastest drummer," will play for dancers at Merrill's pavilion, Cascade Locks, on Labor day, Monday, with his 12-piece orchestra and band of entertainers.

Hampton amazed the crowd here several weeks ago by his inspired drumming, following the fast-moving rhythm of the "Tiger Rag" by throwing his sticks in the air, beating on the floor, the piano guitar, with never a break in tempo. Singing, unusual dancing, unusual music will feature the half-hour floor show given by the colored band.

Hampton's orchestra, in addition to the entertainment, is noted for its ability to play music that is easy to dance to.

BOLT BREAKS NOSE

A broken nose was suffered by Jack Barry of Cascade Locks when at work for Columbia Construction company on the cofferdam Thursday night. A bolt on the pile driver broke, flew thru the air to hit above Barry's left eye and smash into his nose. He nearly fell into the swiftly-moving Columbia before fellow workmen caught him. Now his nose is in a partial cast, secured by adhesive tape.

Cannon, Multnomah county school superintendent has been invited to appear at the meeting. Cannon is in favor of the Bonneville PTA, says he will do all he can to help it along if parents decide to organize.

RALPH WILLIAMS SETS UP AREA'S FIRST RADIO BROADCASTING STATION

The first radio broadcasting station in the dam area is being installed this week by Ralph Williams of the West Coast Power company in his home at Cascade Locks.

"W7EYG, Cascade Locks, calling CK, CK, CK"—if you pick that up on your short wave set, don't think you're hearing things. It'll just be Williams, ardent radio amateur, trying to get someone on the ether to talk to him.

Williams built the set from his own designs in Santa Cruz, Calif., where he operated it under the call letters, W7JUK. Its power is 230 watts, although the average amateur station is around 20 or 30 watts. Through the "mike" Williams can call up Pacific coast and mid-west stations most any time he wants to, and on favorable nights, has reached the east coast.

MAJOR FOX, MAJOR WILLIAMS PROMOTED
