

AIR-CONDITIONING AIDS HAY FEVER SUFFERERS

With the hay fever season in full swing, air-conditioning of railroad cars is affording relief to victims, according to F. N. Finch, Union Pacific railroad general manager. Scores of passengers, Finch said, have informed Union Pacific representatives that the pollen-free air of air-conditioned cars relieved them of hay fever while traveling.

This reaction of the traveling public was foretold months ago, Finch said, by Dr. Herman Bundensen, Chicago, board of health president and nationally-known health authority. When told that western railroads had completed their \$19,000,000 air-conditioning program Dr. Bundensen predicted:

"This contribution to the health and comfort of the traveling public should give real encouragement to those who have in the past suffered because of the atmospheric conditions associated with cross country travel, especially those afflicted with hay fever."

Air-conditioned equipment, including coaches, of the Union Pacific's leading trains strains all pollen and dust from air entering the cars. Windows and doors are kept closed and the air, cooled to the preferred temperature for travel comfort, is drawn out of the car and renewed with fresh air every four minutes.

EAGLE CREEK PROVES INCREASINGLY POPULAR SPOT FOR PICNICKERS

Popularity of Eagle creek national forest camp as the favorite picnic spot of the Columbia gorge is on the increase, forest service records indicate.

While bad weather kept away a large crowd week ago Sunday, the week before saw nearly 2,000 persons registered and probably as many more present. From May 1, 1935 to August 11, 1935, a total of 42,817 picnickers have visited the grounds, according to A. O. Waha, supervisor of the Mt. Hood National forest. This is an increase of 4,123 over the same period last year. Waha believes the increase due partly to the fact that visitors are not permitted to camp or picnic on the dam reservation, except on the fish hatchery grounds.

August 10 saw a salmon barbecue luncheon for 250 members of the American Pharmaceutical association. Two weeks ago the Portland Kiwanis brought the 30 boys and seven girls of the "On to Alaska with Buchanan" party from Detroit, Mich., to Eagle creek for luncheon.

LEGION ANNOUNCES BIG DEER HUNT CONTEST; RIFLES TO BE PRIZES

Deer hunters will have something definite to spur them on when the hunting season opens September 22.

Prizes of hunting rifles to the exhibitors of the best blacktail and mule buck of the season will be awarded by the Bonneville American Legion post's sporting committee, Charles Bellarts, chairman, announced last week.

The contest is restricted to dam employees, or to those living between the 40 and 43 mileposts of the Columbia river highway, whether employed on the dam or not. There'll be no signing up or other red tape, according to Bellarts, other than that the deer must be displayed for five or six hours in front of French's so judges can measure it and the public see it.

The two grand prize rifles will be paid for by the Legion from its sports funds and from proceeds of the salmon fishing contest grand prize, which the winner refused to claim. Dam area merchants are expected to offer other prizes, to be announced at a later date.

L. M. French will provide a display case, seven feet high, all glassed in to keep an entire deer in it away from flies and heat. Doc O. L. M. Hauser will check and weigh in the deer. Under Chairman Bellarts on the committee are: Vern Kruse, Fred Abbot, Lee Summerville, Charles Shinn.

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
