CIVIL SERVICE TO GIVE JUNIOR ENGINEER TEST

Examination for the position of junior engineer in one of 11 optional subjects at \$2,000 per year have been announced by the civil service commission.

Applications must be on file with the commission in Washington not later than September 16. Blanks may be obtained from any first class postoffice, nearest being at Portland. Optional subjects are aeronautical, agriculture, ceramics, chemical, civil, electrical, mechanical, mining, petroleum, structural concrete and steel, the last being one test.
