the \$72,000.

The move to "earmark" the \$72,000 and have it set aside originated at the Chamber of Commerce Thursday. Prior to the noonday luncheon Laber caused Mayor Nelson and the members of the council to be invited to luncheon. There the subject was brought up and discussed. Saturday afternoon Laber again rounded up Mayor Nelson and members of the council and brought them together at the Bridge of the Gods hotel, where he urged that they join in signing an agreement under terms of which they said they would ask the PWA heads to reserve funds for the town, subject to a further and formal application.

Meantime, a mass meeting had been called for Saturday night in Odd Fellows hall. The hall was filled with citizens desirous of hearing the proposition discussed. Ira Owen, president of the chamber, acted as chairman. He introduced Mayor Nelson and other members of the new city administration. Max Millsap, Laber and C. C. Hockley, a representative of PWA spoke. All explained means of obtaining the proposed loan, told how it might be used.

Laber expressed the opinion that the \$40,000 bond issue could be retired through amortization of interest and principal over a period of years. He said he believed the bonded indebtedness could be retired without levying taxes on property. This would be accomplished by building up a reserve fund out of earnings from the municipal water system and estimated earnings from a proposed city-owned light and power system.

The number of water users was reckoned by Laber to be 350. By assessing each a dollar a month the city would procure gross revenues sufficient to take care of the annual payments in addition to operating costs.

After hearing the speakers the crowd of people in the hall voted to indorse action taken by the council and urged it to have the \$72,000 put away, subject to an official request for a loan.

MOORE SELLS GARAGE, GAS STATION TO DYCK

Shirley Moore sold his garage and service station on the east edge of Cascade Locks to D. H. "Dick" Dyck, who took possession Saturday. Dyck has had a number of years of garage and mechanical experience. He and Mrs. Dyck have been living at Dodson and originally came from Hood River. He will be associated with Arvie D. Finch of Bridal Veil in the venture.

Dyck plans complete and immediate renovizing of the building and grounds. He will carry Richfield products and will add another gas pump. The wrecking car will be remodeled and overhauled. Car storage space will be added. He will offer car greasing shortly, with possibility of installing a car washrack. The garage will be open 24 hours a day for gasoline and wrecking work.

Moore, who with his family has moved to Tooth Rock, says he will not open another garage, but will go to work on the dam. He started his garage six years ago, is well-known in the district.

SPEED WARNING GIVEN

A new sign, warning motorists that maximum speed on the newly paved reservation streets is 25 miles per hour, has been set up by U. S. engineers at the dam entrance.

DAM'S JUNIOR OFFICER SLATED FOR TRANSFER

Second Lieutenant Robert G. MacDonnell, youngest army engineer officer resident at the dam, is slated for transfer about September 15 to the Sixth Engineers at Fort Lawton in Seattle.

Lieutenant MacDonnell was assigned to Bonneville by the war department about a year ago for training, after graduation from West Point in 1934. His transfer is looked upon as sign that his training is a success and everyone hates to see him go.

PRE-SCHOOL CLASS STARTS

A pre-school class for children between the ages of three and six will be opened this week by Mrs. M. M. Harrell at her home, first house east of Penn's tavern. Mrs. Harrell, who graduated from Chicago Teachers college, majoring in pre-school work, will care for children by the hour or day.

Paving End at Locks in Sight

The widened and straightened Columbia river highway through Cascade Locks stands practically finished this week with the road crew putting on the top finish.

The 40-foot pavement, two and one-half times as wide as the road it replaces, runs .91 miles through the town. After innumerable delays, paving was begun week ago last Saturday and hurried through. Number of layers of gravel and oil varies because some spots had to be brought up to final grade.

Contractor F. J. Kernan has until September 10 to finish the job. Main work remaining is to finish the eight-foot shoulders on either side between curb and pavement, finish the gravelled sidewalks.

Shoulders will be scraped, rolled and drains opened up. Fine gravel will be spread on the sidewalks, big rocks taken out, and the walks packed down hard with the power roller. No oil will be used on them.

CAMPER STARTS FIRE

Forest rangers and state police are looking for a tan colored car carrying camping equipment and bearing Wyoming licenses, whose passengers are believed to have been responsible for a fire Sunday afternoon a mile and a half east of Viento.

The fire broke into dry grass, extended slightly over a half acre in area, to be the largest fire in the district this season. It spoiled the district's record of not having a single Class "A" fire, above one-quarter acre, this summer. Crews under District Ranger Roy L. Weeman of Columbia Gorge station put it under control within an hour, although a watch was maintained all night by six CCC men.
