

200 CCC BOYS LOOKED FOR SOON AT WYETH

Fifteen CCC men under Lieutenant Bocchicchio moved out of Camp Cascade Locks at Wyeth Monday on completion of quarters for 200 men.

Full force is expected to arrive between the first and 15th of next month, according to Lieutenant Bocchicchio, who was detailed to Washougal. Present plans are that the camp will be run full all winter.

Construction of three buildings, a garage, blacksmith shop and toll storage shed was begun this week by a forest service crew from Columbia Gorge district ranger station. The buildings are expected to be complete by the first of the month.

BONNEVILLE PARENTS ORGANIZE PTA GROUP

Parents and teachers of Bonneville grade school children met Thursday afternoon, voted to organize a Parent-Teachers association, affiliate with the national group. Forty were present.

Frank C. Linton, Bonneville school board chairman, was named temporary chairman, Mrs. Tom G. Waring, temporary secretary. Permanent officers will be elected next Wednesday at 3 p. m. in the schoolhouse.

To the nominating committee were named Mrs. Robert M. LePere, chairman, Mrs. Charles Bellarts, Mrs. James Faubion, Mrs. Michael Miller, Mrs. E. E. Sohlstrom. To frame a set of by-laws, Mrs. T. L. Jones was named chairman of a committee of Mrs. Earl Wilson and Mrs. W. W. Lax.

PAYROLL AT DAM 2117: COLUMBIA HAS 775 MEN

Contractors and the United States engineers employed a total of 2117 men at the dam last week. Largest payroll was that of Columbia Construction company, which reported 775. General-Shea reported 425; Orino, Bell & Malcom, 60; Orino, Saremal & Birkenier, 197; Warren, 35; the engineers, 625.

Columbia is expected to double its number of men after it begins to pour concrete on the giant block, or foundation, for the spillway dam, but indications are that the peak of more than 3,000 men, reported last winter, will never be reached again.

BRICE REPLACES MORSE

Howard Brice of Portland is new assistant to Ranger Albert Wiesendanger at Eagle creek station. Brice replaces Joe Morse, who was called to Harrisburg by an injury to his father. Brice will remain until October 1, when the protective assistant's term runs out.

COLUMBIA BACK AGAIN TO NEAR NORMAL FLOW

With the water falling steadily, the Columbia has practically returned to normal after the summer freshet. It was still reported to be flowing 118,000 second cubic feet Monday. This is still above the normal flow of about 100,000 second cubic feet, but the river is going down and is expected to remain about stationary from the latter part of September until January, when the winter freshet will cause it to rise a few feet.

During the peak of the flood the river rose to 40 feet above sea level. Since the peak passed it has fallen to about 17 feet above sea level. This is a drop of 23 feet.

AUDITORIUM DANCES SET

Public dances will be held in the dam reservation auditorium every two weeks beginning a week from Friday, the Bonneville Recreation association board of governors has decided. Admission charges will be at 40c for men, 25c for women until further notice, according to Dan Peacock, dance chairman.

DAM AUDITORIUM GETS

COAT OF WHITE PAINT

Visitors on the dam reservation last week were startled a bit when they saw painters start slapping a coat of white paint on the red brick sides of the new auditorium.

The new brick administration building is next in line for a white paint job, as will all buildings to be constructed in the future. White is the official color for all reservation permanent buildings.

PAINTINGS ADORN TAVERN

Several of Hal Babbitt's excellent water color paintings are now framed and hung on the walls of Bonny Villa tavern. One, painted last week, shows the Tanner creek railroad viaduct, another the dam reservation entrance, a third fishing boats on Lake Union in Seattle. Babbitt is well known for his paintings.

HIGHWAY PATCHING JOB

ADVANCES PAST LOCKS

State highway crews, who for several weeks have been moving past the dam on their job of taking the bumps out of the Columbia river highway, finished the Multnomah Falls-Cascade Locks section last week, are now well on their way to Hood River.

The crews are laying a large amount of blacktop in patches to raise sunken spots or smooth out rough places. Travel past their equipment is being delayed by the necessity for one-way traffic. New guard rails were completed early this week along turns in front of Columbia Gorge district ranger station.

EAGLE CREEK RELIEF WORKERS LIKE JOBS

Though the forest service rides them free into Portland, only nine of the 30 Emergency Relief Act men now working at Eagle creek spent the weekend in Portland.

This is proof that they like their surroundings and their work, says Ranger Albert Wiesendanger of Eagle creek station. In the three weeks that the ERA men have been there fixing up the camp grounds, helping fight fires, nearly everyone of them has gained in both weight and a healthier outlook on life, he says.

The men were recruited from Multnomah county relief rolls to spend perhaps a year at Eagle creek enlarging the favorite Columbia gorge picnic spot, building a foot bridge, several new trails and other projects. Fire duty has taken a large part of their time so far, since the fire season is at its height at present.

HIGHWAY GETS STRIPING

State highway crews are brightening up the Columbia river highway by repainting the yellow stripe down its center, designed to keep traffic on its proper side. Two-mile section between Eagle creek and Bonneville is all finished, and the crew is moving on west. Painting is done by machinery that paints a straight even line.

BEER LICENSES RESTORED

Permission to sell beer, revoked in three restaurants of the district by the Oregon Liquor control commission for periods ranging from five to 10 days, was restored Saturday before the order became effective.

DRIVERS' LICENSE EXAMS

Next visit of the state inspectors to give tests for drivers' and chauffeurs' licenses will be October 3 from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m. at the reservation library. He will come again October 31. No examination is required for license renewal except in rare cases.

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
