State Building
New Hatchery

Ground was broken last week for foundations of the new hatchery for the state fish hatchery at Bonneville.

The building is the closest of all the hatchery group to the new fishways which Columbia Construction company is building to carry salmon around the dam. When complete with hatching troughs and equipment it will cost about \$16,000.

The hatchery will be 50 by 150 feet, of wood and concrete construction. Roof will be trussed, eliminating the necessity for posts. A balcony is included, from which the public may look down on the hatching troughs. A complete exhibit, showing the life cycle of the salmon from the time he is an egg until he returns from the sea to spawn, is planned for display on the balcony, according to Archy Anderson, in charge of the hatchery.

When the new building is finished this winter, the old hatchery built in 1909, will be torn down. Though the new building is smaller in dimensions, it has an average capacity of 20,000,000 eggs, compared to 15,000,000. The difference is due to modern design largely elimination of waste space.

The present hatchery has aided the birth of anywhere from 12,000,000 to 25,000,000 salmon annually in the 26 years of its life.

HIGHWAY CREW MOVES

The crew employed by the state highway department to patch the paving on the highway between Portland and The Dalles has finished its work in the Bonneville dam district and moved on to Hood River. The crew stopped in Cascade Locks for almost a month. Members of the crew repeatedly expressed a wish to remain in the district as long as possible. They are working near Mitchell Point this week.

HENDERSON TAKES JOB
WITH BAKER CCC CAMP
