BUSINESS COLLEGE IN FIFTH SCHOOL YEAR

POSTMASTERS TOUR

GENERAL-SHEA TEARING AWAY DAMS IN SLOUGH

A steam shovel has attacked the earthen cofferdam in Bradford slough, above the powerhouse and locks, and trucks are hauling the dirt up on the island for use in building the levy which will link the spillway dam to the powerhouse.

Both upper and lower cofferdams in the slough are to be torn out by December 1. When they are gone the water will flow thru the locks and thru the powerhouse. Next summer when the flood comes down the river the surplus water will be diverted through the slough.

Neither of the cofferdams will be taken out below the present water line before the last of the concrete is poured in the powerhouse and locks sometime in November.

Bulk of the material employed in building the cofferdams 18 months ago came from the river. It is more impervious to water than the dirt taken from the island. For this reason it is wanted for use on the upriver side of the earthen fill.

All travel to and from Bradford island has been over the lower cofferdam. The new hard surfaced road, which crosses the locks on the swing bridge, is nearing completion. Within a short time traffic will be routed over this road and General-Shea can begin tearing off the upper part of the lower cofferdam.

MORANS LOCKS TAVERN TAKING FINAL SHAPE

With his application to the state for a Class A package store and beer license okayed by the city council, Frank Moran is rushing to complete his new tavern in Cascade Locks next to Chapman's grocery on the main street.

The building is a one-story structure. Its exterior will be finished in rounded timbers to give it a rustic appearance. The Moran's "T"-shaped home is also nearing completion back of and to the east of the tavern.

Moran has announced no plans for opening yet, but it is expected that he will be doing business within a few weeks. The Morans formerly ran the popular Eagle creek tavern before it was isolated by the deep railroad and highway cut.

THE WRONG BOAT

An early morning fishing trip, a jest about life preservers, the finding of the remnants of a skiff, all led to wild rumors that Guy R. Grazer had gone over the rapids in his new boat and was missing. The story started out innocently enough but after the third or fourth telling it developed into first page copy.

Grazier did go out fishing early Friday morning in his new boat. He anchored very close to the head of the rapids so that at times he could not be seen. A skiff did get away and go over the rapids. But it wasn't his skiff. So the story lost its value.

BUILDS NEW HOME

In anticipation of his coming marriage to Miss Dorothy Goodrich, of Hood River, Henry Rosenback is rushing his new house in Cascade Locks to completion. The four-room, modern home is located next door to Oscar Hyde's house and will be completed in about 10 days. The couple first planned on living on a house boat which Henry has been building for some time. Plans were changed when Henry had a chance to sell the houseboat to Ed Climp of Portland.

SALMON SEASON OPENS; CATCHES NOT LARGE

There is little social activity among the fishing fraternity around Dodson these days. The fall run is on and the season opened on the tenth of the month. About 15 boats have been bringing an under-average catch into the McGowan dock to be weighed and shipped by truck down the river to canneries and cold storage plants. Most of this run has been trucked to the New England Fish Company, at Kalama.

In the first five days of the season it was estimated that 45 tons of fish had been handled at the local dock. Most of these have been tules. The remainder of the catch is made up of chinooks, steelheads, and silversides. The tules have only been bringing 2 cents a pound this season with the other fish running from 3 to 5 cents.

LEGION POST TO GIVE SCHOOL AWARDS AGAIN

School award medals will be given ranking pupils of the eighth grade in the Bonneville school by Bonneville Post No. 88 of the American Legion. The post voted at its last meeting to continue the work in the school.

Awards are given to the boys on basis of scholarship, honor, leadership, courage and service. To the girls it is awarded on basis of courage, companionship, character, service and scholarship.

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
