

STATE OPENS UP FIRST SECTION OF SUPER-HIGHWAY

With a crew of 25 men employed, the state highway department is making rapid progress on the first section of the super-highway, which is nothing more or less than the permanent detour through the railroad cut at Eagle creek.

Army engineers caused the deep cut to be made for the purpose of carrying the Union Pacific railroad tracks through the hill and east along the banks of the river. The state has been given permission to share the cut, but it has to lay the paving.

A covey of trucks has been hauling gravel from Herman creek for days. Hauling of gravel is about completed, but there is fine gravel and sand to be put down. After this task is finished the tar must be on for a binder.

The section of road through the cut will be tied into the permanent construction from the Multnomah county line to Tanner creek. Traffic is now routed over it for the purpose of causing the road bed to settle, preparatory to putting on the tar.

STURGILL SETS RECORD MOVING DIRT ON GRADE

Brent Sturgill, Walla Walla, sub-contractor on the Union Pacific's new lines under Orino, Berkemeier & Saremal, has hung something of a record on the dam project by moving 40,000 cubic yards of material in 22 days.

The Walla Walla contractor is now engaged in moving 40,000 cubic yards of material out of the Ruckel creek section for use in rip rap work west of the toll bridge. He is using a drag line and working three shifts and promises to hang up a second record if the weather continues good.

Sturgill has had the sub-contractor for building the railroad grade between Eagle creek and the point a quarter-mile west of the toll bridge where the new line ties back into the present railroad track.

Great quantities of rock were dumped next to the river last winter and spring on that stretch of line. Now more material is being dumped between the railroad grade and the river. After the grade is completed the tracks will be shifted to permit the contractors to finish the roadbed. The new line will have a curvature of 60 degrees, which is just about perfect.

A telephone cable is to be laid this year between Australia and Tasmania.
