Two comedies and a mystery thriller are on the bill at the Roosevelt theater this coming week.

"No More Ladies", starring Joan Crawford and Robert Montgomery, with Charles Ruggles, Franchot Tone, Edna Mae Oliver, and Reginald Denny in the supporting cast, closes its run tonight.

Friday and Saturday is showing "Accent on Youth", starring Sylvia Sydney and Herbert Marshall. The story revolves about a man who thought he was too old for love, until he found that no man in love is ever too old.

Marshall, the man, is in love with his secretary and has quite a time getting up enough nerve to propose. A young rival steps in. In a hilarious final sequence, Miss Sidney manages to convince Marshall that he loves her, and urges him to stand up against her husband for her. It all ends happily on a comedy note.

"The Man on the Flying Trapeze" which plays Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, can be chalked up as one more laugh fest in Field's long and recent list of screen successes.

Bubbling over with his customary gags, his habitual mirth-provoking, rib-tickling pantomime, his pathetic, helpless blunderings, prepare yourself for a roll in the aisles at this master comic's merrymaking. In the role of a henpecked husband at home, a down-trodden clerk at the office, Fields assumes his characterization, dominating one hilarious scene after another without a stop.

The plot of the story of "The Raven" starring Karloff and Bela Lugosi, which is scheduled for Wednesday and Thursday, is purely imaginative; of course, with the symbol of the raven supplying the motif of the narrative. A mad doctor, Vollin, is suffering from a torture complex and out to demonstrate his theories. His principal victim is an escaped criminal who comes to him to have his face changed. The doctor distorts the man's features and makes a slave of him, then he casts a spell over a beautiful girl and when her father tries to save her he is himself caught in the delirious machinations of the mentally unbalanced doctor.

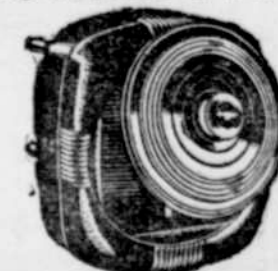
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
