COLUMBIA FALLING; NEAR SEASON'S LOW

With the Columbia still dropping there are indications that the river may reach its low level of 70,000 second cubic feet before the end of the month. The river fell 2,000 second cubic feet on Friday at Cascade Locks and is now well below 90,000 second cubic feet and still going down.

Lowest point reached in 1934 was on October 15. From that point it began to climb, reaching a maximum of nearly 10 times that volume early last summer, when the water was running 10 feet over the cofferdam in mid-channel.
