NEW ROAD, BRIDGE,

OPENED TO PUBLIC

Hard surfacing of the road from the powerhouse to the Columbia Construction company's office has been finished and traffic to Bradford island is now flowing across the swing bridge which spans the ship canal. The bridge was thrown open to travel Sunday. In time the bridge will be used in switching cars of material from the railroad yards to the powerhouse. When that time arrives trucks and private cars will be compelled to share the roadway with the switch engines, but there is room for both.

With the bridge open the army engineers are in position to tear away the earthen cofferdams in Bradford slough. However, the dams will not be demolished before December 1, when the foundation of the powerhouse and concrete work on the ship canal will be finished and turned over to the government by the contractors.
