Stepping to the strains of tuneful music 200 couples helped J. A. Merrill reopen his remodeled dance pavilion Saturday night. The floor was crowded with merry-makers, the walls were lined with tables, and waiters swung through the crowd serving the guests.

The crowd found its way into the pavilion through a new entrance which had been built on the east side of the restaurant. Inside the crowd found the walls and ceiling sealed with plywood, saw a shell over a new stage at the east end of the hall. The orchestra, imported from Portland, provided excellent music, and the low ceiling improved the acoustics by taking the sharp edges off the notes.

Early in the week Merrill became busy with plans for hustling a furnace into the building. Heating the pavilion was a serious problem last season. This year the hall is to be warm and comfortable, even in the coldest weather. Efforts are being made to have the heating system in operation before the week end.
