Bonney Park is being made into
an attractive residential district.
Under the direction of Robert T.
Jacobs, owner of the tract, a bull-
dozer and caterpillar has been put
to work opening up the two prin-
cipal streets preparatory to grav-
eling them and generally improv-

The work of opening the two
