HONOR STUDENTS ARE ACCUSED IN MAIL FRAUD CASE

**Two College Graduates Are
Indicted for the Selling of
Fraudulent Stock.**

New York.—Wallace G. Garland, Yale graduate and young financial genius, and his partner in business operations, Arnold C. Mason, honor graduate of Yale's Sheffield scientific school, were named defendants in the largest mail fraud indictment ever voted by a federal grand jury.

The indictment named 52 individuals, including one woman and 20 corporations, the majority of which were organized by Garland and Mason, and contains 42 counts of mail fraud and one of conspiracy spread over 77 pages of a typed copy of the bill.

It charges that between the years 1931 and 1934 the defendants sold \$4,500,000 in stock to the public which was and is worthless, and that representations made in these sales violated the federal mail fraud statute.

In Business Eight Years.

According to Assistant United States Attorney James Murtagh in the indictment Garland and Mason began their operations in 1927.

Garland finished Yale in 1925 winning high praise from Prof. Irving Fisher for his unorthodox and interesting financial ideas. Mason, the son of an officer of the Liggett & Myers Tobacco company, finished Yale with honors in 1927.

Garland at that time possessed a patent on an automatic signal device developed by his father, which would regulate traffic at road intersections. He and Mason organized the Automatic Signal corporation to promote the patent which was at that time valued on the books at \$7,500.

Garland later organized the Automatic Signal Acceptance corporation. The value of the patent then was boosted on the books to \$1,000,000. Garland later organized several subsidiaries, always raising the book value of his patent.

Holding Firm Formed.

Finally Garland organized the Public Service Holding corporation, the stock of all the subsidiaries was turned over to the holding corporation and an intensive campaign to sell its stock was begun in 1931.

By this time the value of the patent is alleged to have been raised to \$35,000,000 on the books, and salesmen for the stock, according to the charges, represented that it was controlled by the New Jersey Public Service company.

A flood of complaints to the Post Office department caused an investigation last summer which ended in the arrest of Garland, Mason, and others. In all 15 persons have been held in bail on mail fraud complaints by the United States commissioner, and all of the Garland corporations have been banned by the state attorney general.

Sisters Work as Sailors to Make Tour of World

Vancouver, B. C.—An attempt to work their way around the world in ships is being made by two young Vancouver sisters.

They are Clare M. Wilson, a schoolteacher, and Katherine, a stenographer. They started out on the first lap of their journey aboard the British freighter Harmatris, on which they signed as members of the crew, early last month. The Harmatris will take them to Sydney, N. S. W.

From Sydney they hope to catch a boat to India on the West coast of Australia, work their way to South Africa and up the east coast of Africa and then go through Europe and England, returning by New York and Montreal.

The sisters said they had no special motive for undertaking the adventure, except for the desire to "see the world."

At the Theatre

Romance, adventure and comedy are again represented at the Roosevelt theater this coming week.

The new schedule is opened Friday and Saturday with Elissa Landi and Paul Cavanagh in a rather sophisticated drama entitled, "Without Regret".

Miss Landi is seen as a woman torn between two loves in her latest characterization. Having met and married a handsome, aviator scoundrel after a one-day whirlwind courtship in China, she later marries a distinguished, successful London doctor, believing her first husband killed in a plane wreck. When the jealous ex-sweetheart of her first husband tells her that he is alive and demands blackmail for her silence in the possession of Miss Landi's love letters, and threatens to expose the whole bigamous scandal which will mean the ruination of Miss Landi's home and her husband's career.

Close on the heels of this revelation, Kent Taylor, the aviator husband, makes his presence known by seeking medical advice from Paul Cavanagh, the physician husband. Many tense, exciting situations follow as Frances Drake, the jilted sweetheart, battles for Taylor's love, Miss Landi battles for her letters, and Taylor battles for both her love and the letters. Cary Grant and Claude Rains show Monday and Tuesday in a stirring tale of adventure, "The Last Outpost."

The story is an impressive, authentic picturization of the conflict arising between the Turks and the British army in Mesopotamia during the World War. Two British officers, one in the British Intelligence Service, the other attached to the armored car division, meet under strange circumstances. Their adventures lead them into many dangers, dangers touched with thrills and romance. Unaware that he has fallen in love with his friend's wife, Gertrude Michael, who acts as his nurse in a Cairo hospital, Grant takes steps to find the man she does not love and hasn't seen nor heard from in three years. Rains resolves to track him down and kill him. They meet again in a deserted fort in the interior, and there, in a tense, dramatic sequence, Rains decides whether he should leave his friend Grant to the mercy of the natives or to die in a seething forest fire, to avenge the memory of his wife.

The comedy for the week is supplied in "The Girl Friend". Wednesday and Thursday, starring Ann Sothern, Jack Haley and Roger Pryor.

With Miss Sothern as a demure country miss, "The Girl Friend" concerns itself with the hilarious complications that beset Pryor, as an out-of-work actor, when he pretends to be a theatrical producer just to secure a summer's lodging for himself and his two colleagues, Victor Killian and Ray Walker.

Jack Haley portrays Miss Sothern's brother, as an aspiring playwright trying to crash fame with a play about Napoleon. When the trio, headed by Pryor, comes to the rambling farmhouse of Haley and Miss Sothern, a great deal of interest is shown in the Napoleonic tragedy. To them the whole thing is just a comedy stunt, but the situation becomes acute when Haley mortgages the old homestead to raise enough money to convert the barn into a little theatre for a try-out of his play.
