At the Theatre

With the beginning of a new year the Roosevelt theater at Bonneville announces tentative pictures scheduled for the next two months. In glancing over the list one sees some of the most famous pictures of the past year are to appear.

Among those that the writer enjoyed most that are coming soon are "Golddiggers" of 1935, "Storm Over the Andes", "Big Broadcast", "Hands Across the Table", "China Seas", "Last Days of Pompeii", "Bordertown", "Devil Dogs of the Air", "Broadway Melody", and "Three Musketeers".

This coming week presents a homey comedy, a comedy drama, and a stirring drama — "Lady Tubbs" with Alice Brady, Douglas Montgomery and Anita Louise today for two nights. The film play has a rollicking, dashing quality about it that makes a picture of rare delight.

Alice Brady is most happily cast as the plain-spoken cook in a railway construction camp, who inherits a fortune and adopts the spurious title of "Lady Tubbs" in order to further the romance of her niece with Montgomery, son of title-worshipping social lights who have previously looked with disdain on the young girl because she lacks acceptable family connections.

The story opens on a new railroad under construction in Kansas and then shifts to the luxurious beauty of a Long Island estate. Director Crosland has maintained a tempo of fast fun, and the story trips along swiftly and joyously to its climax.

Sunday, Monday and Tuesday

brings "It's in the Air" with Jack Benny, the radio, stage and screen comedian, in the role of a Broadway "chiseler," who becomes a national hero instead of a "number" when he makes a world record for altitude in a stratosphere balloon.

Una Merkel, portraying Benny's wife, enacts a dramatic role for the first time in her screen career. Ted Healy, Nat Pendleton, Harvey Stephens and Grant Mitchell are featured in the cast.

Wednesday and Thursday is scheduled Garbo in "Anna Karenina". The story, one of the great "immortals" of the past century, is Leo Tolstoy's "Anna Karenina", presented against a background of imperialistic Russia of fifty years ago—the story of a woman torn between a clandestine love for Count Vronsky, a romantic youth, and duty to her stern husband, Karenin.

In the cast we see such notable players as Maureen O'Sullivan, playing a sister-in-law to Garbo; Freddie Bartholomew, playing her small son; Basil Rathbone, playing her husband; May Robson, as March's mother; Reginald Owen, as Garbo's brother; Phoebe Foster, as another sister-in-law; Gyles Isham, an English idol; Reginald Denny, as a gallant young officer, and a score more familiar names.
