FIRE PURCHASES OK'D; WILLIAMS QUILTS AS CHIEF

Purchase of a fire truck with tank and other equipment was approved by the Cascade Locks volunteer fire department at a special meeting Friday night.

Resignation of Ralph Williams as chief, due to pressure of business, was accepted. M. L. Morgan, assistant chief, was named acting chief by Ed Trimble, president of the department, until a regular election can be held.

The equipment was purchased by Acting Chief M. L. Morgan and Mayor Charles Nelson with funds appropriated by the city council. It includes a rebuilt truck, 200-gallon water tank, reel and 200 feet of one-inch hose, nozzle, two chemical fire extinguishers, power take-off to drive the pump, several fire axes. Purchase was made for considerably less than bids submitted by 10 fire equipment companies. The red-painted truck and tank were due to arrive in Cascade Locks early this week.

The department voted to recommend that the city council pass an ordinance requiring the inspection of flues and other fire breeding places in Cascade Locks homes and buildings. Purchase of the smaller of the two sirens now located on top of Morgan's garage was recommended. The smaller siren, the department felt, was a more piercing tone. Both were installed by equipment companies on approval.

WORK BEGINS ON NEW FORESTRY WAREHOUSE

A roaring bulldozer began breaking up the ground at Columbia Gorge district ranger station at Herman creek this week for the construction of a two-story fire equipment warehouse and garage for the forest service.

The building will be of rustic design, making use of native rock and hand-hewn cedar shakes. Its 94 feet of length will face the highway. Space for a garage, machine shop, blacksmith shop, tool rooms and lockers for fire fighters is provided. Twenty CCC boys form the construction crew.

When the building is finished in early summer, the present garage and several small buildings will be demolished as unsightly according to District Ranger Roy L. Weeman. Finished cost is estimated at \$5,000.

CCC STARTS WORK ON EAGLE CREEK BRIDGE

Construction of the pedestrian suspension bridge across Eagle creek from the camp grounds was begun this week by 23 CCC boys under the supervision of District Ranger Roy L. Weeman of Columbia Gorge station.

The bridge, 136 feet long, will connect the campground with the new trail to Wauna point, also being built. The span will be of rustic design, supported by steel cables anchored in concrete. Completion is expected in about two months.

The Wauna point trail is now finished for the first three-quarters of a mile. Another mile of side-hill zigzags will bring it to the top, from which a widespread view of the dam and of the Columbia gorge can be seen.

CCC boys have started on the campground's community kitchen, a building 24 by 36 feet in size.

Eddie Kuttman plans to leave Friday for Portland where he will attend the Adcox engineering school.

DAM TEAMS HUMBLE REED COLLEGE BOYS

Reed college athletes came up from Portland Thursday to pick the boys of Bonneville, but returned with the firm conviction that the "yackhammer" is mightier than the textbook.

NEW SWITCH IMPROVES LOCKS POWER SERVICE

Electric power was cut off in and around Cascade Locks for an hour and a half as Ralph Williams of West Coast Power company installed a new switch box between the Locks and the Herman creek hydroelectric plant.

The new switch will enable the use of electricity from the Washington side of the river should the juice be cut off from the Herman creek plant, according to Williams. Thus, instead of power being cut off for an hour or more until the lines to the Herman creek plant can be repaired, a flip of the switch will bring the light on again with electricity from across the river.
