WATER ASSURED; CITY BUYS HASKINS' RIGHTS

giving him the city's right in the Stewart spring was too much of a concession. Victor Wigren rose from the audience to plead that the city should not spend so much money; that it should wait another year or two, get along with existing systems until the time when the government's 10-inch pipeline to the locks would be turned over. G. N. Heggard told the council it should "quit stalling. It's our only plan for adequate and pure water." He cited the overwhelming vote in favor of the municipal system.

Comic relief to the tense session was provided when a figure staggered through the smoke-filled council chamber, on its back a packboard bearing a bucket of water, labelled "Dry creek." Weaving on his feet, the water-bearer addressed the council to plead against the Haskins proposal, but after it had already been passed.

The council delayed discussion of a water rate ordinance until Monday's meeting. A. T. Stewart called the audience to give the city fathers a vote of thanks for their settling the water situation. Wild handclapping testified their thanks.

Mrs. Juanita Lewallen, at Monday's session, asked that the Portland city council be invited to luncheon in Cascade Locks when it makes its proposed tour of Bonneville dam. The invitation was issued.

Beer license for Mrs. Della Smith of Dew Drop inn was passed.

The fire ordinance, No. 12, passed the third reading and became a law. Purchase of the small fire siren was recommended by Acting Fire Chief M. L. Morgan, but the council delayed action when Councilman Max Millsap, finance chairman, asked it to wait until another small siren could be installed for testing.

VFW PLANS DANCE AT CARSON ON SATURDAY

Veterans of Foreign Wars will dance to the strains of Meeker's popular Five Aces dance band Saturday, January 25th, in the American Legion hall at Carson, Wash.

BURGLAR BREAKS INTO STORE AT BONNEVILLE

A prowler late Saturday night or early Sunday morning forced his way into the Bonneville Mercantile company's store, escaping unseen with cigarettes and other merchandise.

The burglary was discovered by Frank Sholkoff when he opened the store Sunday morning. Muddy footprints wandered around among the counters, the grocery department refrigerator door was open and a ham lay on the floor wrapped in a white apron. Sholkoff notified the Multnomah county sheriff's office, which dispatched officers to the store.

A double-bitted axe, discovered leaning against the back of the building, was apparently used by the burglar to force the back door. Extent of the loss will be known as soon as the inventory is finished.

LOCKS LETTERS TAKE TO FLYING, SAYS HALL

Cascade Locks people are becoming more air-minded all the time, believes postmaster Frank Hall.

Every week, he says, sees an increase in the number of airmail letters being sent out through the Locks postoffice. He estimated a daily average of five at the present time.

A large number of letters were sent to the Philippines on the maiden flight of the China Clipper, while most of the airmail goes to points within the country, occasional letters go by plane to Panama, Cuba and South America.

DAM PEOPLE WITNESS OREGON COAST STORM

The roaring gale that struck the Oregon coast and sent the freighter Iowa to its doom Sunday was witnessed by Mr. and Mrs. George Blaisdell of Cascade Locks. The Blaisdells, with their children, Arola and George, and Mrs. Florence Wahlert, Mrs. Blaisdell's mother, were making their first tour of the Oregon beaches.

"Waves at least 40 or 50 feet high were coming in," Blaisdell says. "They'd crash on the rocks and send showers of salt spray flying a quarter or half a mile inland." He judged the waves were a 30-foot rock out from shore that was continually submerged by the crests.

The Blaisdells spent most of their trip at Depoe bay. On their return to the Locks, they encountered further evidence of the strength of the storm—trees and telephone poles across the highway. They drove for hours through the swollen waters of the Yamhill and Salmon rivers, which had risen across the road.
