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Ordinance No. 13 City of Cascade Locks, Oregon

ORDINANCE REGULATING THE USE OF WATER FOR DOMESTIC AND OTHER PURPOSES IN THE CITY OF CASCADE LOCKS, AND PROVIDING THE RATE OF CHARGE THEREOF.

SECTION 1—It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to use the water from the City's water system, in the City of Cascade Locks, for the purpose of irrigation or sprinkling or for the purpose of washing or flooding any sidewalk in front of any building in the City of Cas-

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cade Locks, unless permission therefor shall have first been obtained in writing from the superintendent of the City's water system, and he is hereby empowered and authorized to grant such permission in accordance with the terms of this ordinance.

SECTION 2—That the following rules for obtaining and using water from the municipal system in the City of Cascade Locks be and they are hereby adopted:

(1) Applications for the use of water must be made to the Superintendent of the Water Works of the City of Cascade Locks at the water office therein in writing, and the applicant must state fully and truly all the purposes for which the water must be required and must agree to conform to the Rules and Regulations herein written as a condition for the use of said water.

(2) No person supplied with water from the City's mains will be entitled to use it for any purposes other than those stated in his or her application, or to supply, in any way, other persons or families.

(3) Should the applicant, or occupant of the premises, desire any additional service or fixtures, or to apply the water for a purpose not stated in the original application, a new application must be made and a permit obtained at the office of the Water Department as above provided.

(4) Should it be desired to discontinue the use of water for any special purpose, whether for closets, bath tubs, irrigation, hose connections, or other fixtures, the faucet must be removed, the branch, pipe or service supplying the fixture plugged, and notice given in writing at the office of the water department of the City before any reduction will be made in rates.

(5) Should it be desired to discontinue the use of all the water supplied to any given premises for a period of not less than one month, notice in writing must be given and payment in full of all arrears, if any there be, made at the office of the Water Department. The water will then be turned off and turned on again upon application without charge, but no remission of charges will be made for a period of less than one month, or without the notice prescribed in this paragraph.

(6) The service pipes shall be so arranged that the supply to each separate house, or premises, may be controlled by a separate stop-cock, placed within and near the line of the street curb, and one person must pay for all the water used through said service, for his own use or for the use of others to whom it may be accessible.

(7) Where water is now supplied, through one service pipe, to several houses, families, or persons, the City may, at their discretion, either decline to furnish water until separate services are provided, or may continue the supply on the condition that water may be shut off from all in the case of non-payment or violation of the Rules and Regulations by any one.

(8) Water for building purposes will be furnished only by payment in advance and on the written estimate of the manager or architect of the brick, stone or plastering or other material for which the water is to be used. For material not stated in the estimate the application must be renewed. Any water-rate payer may, if he chooses, allow the use of water through the hose connection on his premises for building purposes. Provided, the building shows beforehand the written permit from the office of the Water Department and receipt of the payment for the water. When water is allowed to be taken without said permit and receipt being

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first shown, the owner, or occupant, will be liable for the charges and the water may be shut off from the premises until payment is made.

(9) Permits for private hydrants, irrigation, hose connections, closets or bath tubs will be granted only to persons paying for the use of water on their premises for other purposes to which it may be applied.

(10) The use of hose for sprinkling the streets is forbidden under any circumstances.

(11) The use of water for irrigation is prohibited, except between the hours established by the City, and then only allowed through nozzle of hose or spray stand, in form of spray.

(12) The water may, at any time, be shut off from the mains without notice, for repairs or other necessary purposes, and the City will not be responsible for any subsequent damages. Water for steam boilers will not be furnished by direct pressure from the mains. Tanks for holding an

ample reserve of water should always be provided by the owners of the boilers. While water is temporarily shut off from the main the hot-water faucets should be kept open by the occupants of the premises to allow the steam to escape from the water heaters.

(13) Water will not be furnished where there are defective or leaking faucets, closets or other fixtures, or where there are water closets or urinals without self-closing valves, or tanks without self-acting float valves, and when such may be discovered the supply will be withdrawn.

(14) When a permit has been obtained for the introduction of water, a corporation cock for the mains will be furnished, of such size as may be determined by the Manager or Superintendent of the Water Department.

(15) The tap and ferrule and stop-cock, at the curb, will be furnished by the City and remain the property of the City, and it shall be unlawful for any person to interfere therewith.

(16) The service pipes from the mains to the walls of the building must be not less than two feet below the grade of the street, or on a level with the main when it is less than two feet below grade.

(17) Within the basement wall a stop and waste cock, protected from frost, must in all cases be placed, by means of which the service pipes in the building may be drained at night during the freezing weather.

(18) Water must not be allowed to run to waste through any faucet or fixture in order to prevent freezing, or kept running at any time longer than necessary in its proper use. When such waste is found to exist the water will be shut off from the premises. No faucets will be allowed on the outside of any building except hose connections, and the latter must have stop and waste cocks, protected from frost. No hose connections will be allowed on sidewalks except those which have the valves inside the buildings, or which require keys for opening them. They must discharge upwards, so the water can be used for no other purpose than sprinkling.

(19) No plumber or other person will be allowed to make connections with the City's mains, or to make alterations in any conduit, pipe, or other fixture connecting therewith, or to connect pipes when they have been disconnected, or to turn water off or on any premises, without permission from the Manager or Superintendent of the Water Department.

(20) Plumbers doing any work by which water may be drawn from the City's mains must make,

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in writing, a true and accurate return of work done within twenty-four hours after completion, to the Superintendent or the Water Department, and before turning on the water, and must describe the position of the service pipes, ferrules, stop cocks and other fixtures by reference to street and lot corners.

(21) Plumbers failing to perform their work according to the established Rules and Regulations, or executing it unskillfully or to the damage of the City's works, may be debarred from making connections with the City's mains.

(22) Agents of the City may have free access, at proper hours of the day, to all buildings in which water may be delivered from the City's mains, for the purpose of inspecting the condition of the pipes and fixtures and the manner in which the water is used.

(23) On failure to comply with the Rules and Regulations established as a condition to the use of water, or to pay the water rents in the time and manner hereafter provided, the water may be shut off until payment is made of the amount due, with fifty cents in addition for the expense of turning the water off and on.

(24) After the water has been shut off at the stop cock at the curb, as provided in Paragraph 23, if it should be turned on by any person except an employee of the City, an excavation will be made in the street, the water shut off at the tap in the main, and not turned on again until the arrears, the cost of replacing the street pavement and two dollars for the expense of shutting the water off and turning it on again are paid.

(25) The water rates will be due and payable in advance at the office of the City Recorder on the first day of each month (except for elevators or by meters, which are payable on the first day of the succeeding month) and if not paid within the first ten days the water will be shut off from the premises, as provided in Paragraphs 23 and 24. The water rates may be paid in advance for any number of months of each calendar year.

(26) The City of Cascade Locks reserves the right at any time to attach meters to the service pipes of such places, and of such places only, as it may deem best, and to charge for the quantity of water measured, or used, at meter rates, provided the charge for any such place for any one month shall not be less than the schedule rate at which it is listed. All meters shall be and remain the property of the City, and may be removed whenever the City or its Manager may decide to do so. When there appears to be an excessive use or waste of water through any service pipe, a meter will be attached, and the water measured by it during any month in excess of the quantity paid for at the schedule rate will be charged for in addition to the schedule rate, payable in advance for the succeeding month, but the charge for any one month will not be less than the schedule rate.

(27) The foregoing Rules and Regulations must be strictly complied with in every instance, and water must be paid for by all persons supplied according to the following schedule of water rates:

Less discount of 25c on all bills paid within ten days from first of month.
Meter rates to be as follows:
First 5,000 gallons per month 33c per 1000 gallons;
Next 5,000 gallons per month 22c per 1000 gallons;
Next 5,000 gallons per month 16c per 1000 gallons;
All over 20,000 gallons per month 11c per 1000 gallons.

Less 10 per cent discount for payment within ten days from first of month.

SECTION 3—Any person found guilty in violating any of the provisions of Section 2 of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, by the Recorder of the City of Cascade Locks, be fined in the sum of not less than \$5.00, nor more than \$50.00 for each and every offense.

SECTION 4—That inasmuch as the contribution of a water system is about begun and the City is about to buy three existing water systems and water rates must be set and that the failure to enact a rate ordinance such as the foregoing would result in confusion and conflict and great loss to the City, it is hereby adjudged and declared that an emergency exists and that this ordinance shall become immediately operative upon the affirmative vote of three fourths of all the members of the Common Council, taken by ayes and noes and also by the mayor.
