JOSEPH McCANDLESS RITES HELD SATURDAY

Funeral services for Joseph H. McCandless, 53, of Bonny Villa, who died Thursday evening in St. Vincent's hospital, Portland, were read Saturday by the Rev. Stanley Trefren of Bonneville.

Services were at the Eastside Undertakers, with burial in Lincoln Memorial park. Mr. McCandless was taken to the hospital several weeks ago suffering from septic sore throat, which developed into bronchial pneumonia and erysipelas. He had been employed at Bonneville for approximately a year and one-half, and had just been given a position as draftsman for Columbia Construction company. He was a world war veteran, having been in hard fighting overseas.

Mr. McCandless is survived by his widow, two sons, Claude, 12, and Robert, 14; three brothers and three sisters, all in California except Mrs. Ashley Myers of Bonny Villa. Mrs. Myers is taking care of the two sons for the present.

Mrs. McCandless rose from her own hospital bed in Portland to attend the funeral. She is suffering from an infected shoulder. She returned to the hospital after the services.

Forest Service

Columbia Gorge District ranger station is no identified by a beautifully handcarved sign, mounted on an unbarked cedar pole beside the highway.

The sign is one of the many that forest service has erected along the Columbia river highway to mark campgrounds, trails, boundaries of state parks and the national forest. Nineteen more are being placed by CCC workers between the Sandy river and Hood river. In addition to being handcarved, the signs are cleverly aged and placed in rustic settings to blend with the natural beauty of the forest.

The bulldozer was still bulldozing away this week at clearing the foundation for Columbia gorge station's new forest warehouse. A large section of the hill is being scraped out. Concrete for the foundation should be poured within a week or so. Materials for the structure are now ready for delivery.

Concrete piers for the Eagle creek campground suspension bridge to the foot of the new Wauna point trail will be all poured by next week and actual bridge construction started. The trail itself has progressed to within about a mile of the summit of the point. It will be finished, the boys say, when they reach the top and can't find any higher ground to build a trail on.
