Jordan, accompanied by his wife and a friend, were descending the steep rock at 9:30 p.m. when he slipped and fell off the trail. He rolled and tumbled about 50 feet to a ledge, all that stopped him from falling 600 feet to death at the base of the rock. His wife and companion descended to the Beacon rock CCC camp for aid. Jordan was discovered after a search in the darkness.

Jordan's exposure to the bitter east wind and subfreezing temperature is complicating his cuts and bruises, but recovery is expected.


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
