The U. S. engineer's speedy tug, Bonneville, is back in service this week after a stay in a Portland shipyard where her two 180-horsepower Sterling Petrel engines were replaced with new motors.

The Bonneville's engines were badly worn from the heavy service of towing and running the swift waters of the Columbia in the two years she has been in service. The twin Sterlings give her a speed of 22 knots.
