LEWIS MAKES REPORT ON RIVER POWER USE

Further development of the Columbia river to generate electric power for heating houses as well as industrial uses is proposed by John Lewis, former state engineer, in a report to the Port of Portland commission, of which he is a member. Lewis advocates that the port commission take an interest in his proposal because the building of hydro-electric projects on the Columbia will also promote slack water navigation.

He insists that it compete with Seattle, high power dams must be built on the upper Columbia. His report, however, has already been rejected by the port commission.

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
