PORTLAND CITY DADS HIT DAM TIEUP PLANS

Bonneville will not be tied up to any other dams in the Columbia basin if the Portland city council has anything to say about it.

The council last week adopted the resolution proposed by Mayor Joseph K. Carson, which declared that the dam is well under way and that nothing should be done which would delay delivery of power to the people of the northwest or that would increase its rates. He opposed any authority that would tie the dams of the Columbia into one project.

Commissioner O. R. Bean urged the council to indorse the McNary bill providing legislation for the dam, but the council declined to do so on grounds that it did not know the contents of the bill.

BOOK SLOT PLACED

A slot where books may be dropped when the building is closed was built into the dam reservation library last week, as a convenience to its patrons, according to Librarian Charles Jones. Library hours are from 11:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. and 6 to 9 p.m. weekdays and from 11:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturdays, but books may be returned via the slot at any other time.
