STAR IRON & STEEL CO. NEW DAM CONTRACTORS

A new contractor appeared on the Bonneville scene last week with the arrival of Star Iron & Steel company of Tacoma, Wash. to install two gantry cranes and lifting beams on the powerhouse.

Star was awarded the \$96,422 contract last fall and began fabricating the cranes and beams in its Tacoma shops early in September. The equipment was assembled in the shops and tested to prove perfect and is now arriving for installation at the dam. A derrick has been installed on the north end of the powerhouse on the 90-foot deck to handle equipment.

At the Theatre

A delightfully exhilarating romantic adventure, "The Lone Wolf Returns," arrives Friday and Saturday at the Roosevelt theatre on the dam reservation with Melvyn Douglas and Gail Patrick in the leading roles.

Based on the famous story by Louis Joseph Vance, the picture continues the amazing adventures of that fascinating fictional rogue, the Lone Wolf, made popular by a series of Vance's celebrated novels. The Lone Wolf, played by Douglas, is a jewel thief. He turns honest because of love for Miss Patrick. But his gang decides to steal her jewels and threatens to involve him should he refuse. He finds himself in the strange role of a law protector and the story swirls to a dramatic climax.

Joe Penner is back on the screen, again with Jack Oakie, but minus his favorite duck. The new Penner picture, "Collegiate," which also has Ned Sparks, Lynne Overman and lovely Frances Langford in the cast will be seen Sunday, Monday and Tuesday.

The story tells how Oakie, Broadway playboy, inherits a girls' boarding school, whose mid-Victorian atmosphere is a major disappointment. Oakie, Overman and Sparks drag in Penner, an amnesia victim with a penchant for shouting "Policeman! Policeman!" and change the institution into a "charm school." Many new songs, specially written for the picture by Gordon and Revel, are played. And this is one "Collegiate" picture which has no football games, no fraternity house antics. The gags are sparkling.

One of the most brilliant musical romances yet seen on the screen is "Rose of the Rancho" showing next Wednesday and Thursday. In it, glamorous Gladys Swarthout, youthful Metropolitan opera star, makes her screen debut opposite John Boles.

"Rose of the Rancho" deals with the life in Monterey, two years after California was admitted to the union. Miss Swarthout is the daughter of a wealthy Spanish landowner. Although affianced to Don Alvarado, war between Spanish vigilantes and land-grabbing Americans brings her a new romance in the person of Boles, secret federal agent.

Most of the action is taken outside, sprinkled so liberally with music as to make it almost an operetta. Miss Swarthout's brilliant voice and surpassing beauty are only equalled by her dramatic ability and Boles is equally effective in his part.
