HATCHERY FORCE GETS SPRING CLEANUP 'BUG'

Preparations for the annual spring influx of visitors to the grounds of the Bonneville fish hatchery are keeping the boys under Ernest Anderson busy.

Ponds have been cleaned out and this week will receive some 3,000,000 new salmon in a day or two. The fish have been hatching in troughs during the winter and are now large enough to take to the pools.

Flowerbeds and stretches of lawn are receiving expert attention of the hatchery's garden crew.

Water supply pipes and drains are being installed in the new hatchery building, which will be ready to receive the fall supply of eggs, according to Anderson. During the summer, troughs and other equipment will be completed.

FORESTERS REBUILD GORGE PHONE LINES

Reconstruction of the forest service telephone line between Columbia gorge district ranger station was begun Monday morning by a crew of five CCC men under Leader Jim Stafford.

The line from the station to Eagle creek camp will be replaced entirely by coppered No. 12 wire. An additional line across the toll bridge at Cascade Locks to Hemlock, Wash., will give connection with the important lookout posts on the summits of Dog mountain and Greenleaf mountain, which oversee a large portion of the Columbia river highway untouched by Oregon-side lookouts.

A new line may be constructed from Eagle creek camp to Tanner butte, where it will cut in on the Larch mountain line. This new line would make two systems out of the present one and correspondingly increase reception by cutting resistance 50 percent.
