PERSONAL SATISFACTION

Cascade Locks has had its ups and downs much more than the average community. First the locks were built and then Wind River timber company operated for a number of years. Each time the town blossomed. This is no boom at all compared with the days of 1894 when there were 19 saloons doing a thriving business in Cascade Locks. The street lighting system approved this week would have been put to shame by the one Mayor Nelson installed in the days when the mill was going full blast.

Each of these projects raised the hopes of the now old residents as to the future of Cascade Locks. With the completion of the locks no permanent benefits were derived with the exception of the four or five maintenance families. The timber within profitable yarding and hauling distance was all utilized and the mill burned. No permanent benefits were received from the second big boom.

Then came the dam. Again the old residents were expected to be enthusiastic over the future. By this time it was an old story with them.

We are in sympathy with the hesitancy with which the old timers look on the projects and ideas put forth by the new population. On the other hand we are not in sympathy with the advantage taken by them by two individuals who promoted for personal satisfaction the recent law suit. The question comes to mind as to why these two should want to pass the buck and not take the responsibility themselves. Were they afraid of being sued if the suit failed?

POSTMASTER

This coming week politics takes a hand in the local affairs of Cascade Locks. Postmaster Frank Hall is being replaced by Margaret Rankin.

For years Mr. Hall has served the community well in the capacity of postmaster. But politics is politics and the postoffice system is still part of the old spoils system.

To the winner belongs the spoils. The democrats are in and the republicans are out.

Cascade Locks has been fortunate in having a man as Frank Hall to look after its mail. We hope that the new postmaster will execute the functions of her office as courteously and efficiently as Mr. Hall did.

DIFFERENCES OF OPINION

Difference of opinion is what makes this world progress and makes it an interesting place to live in.

Cascade Locks and the dam area is at the present time the battleground of large differences of opinion. Practically out of a clear sky the dam was started in a very quiet and dormant community. Many of us came with the dam builders on the assumption that there was money to be made where a large number of men were employed. And now that the project is on its way out, the great difference of opinion arises over the question of what the next few years will bring forth.

The majority of business people have pondered this question at great length, but as yet have not had to reach a decision. The city council of Cascade Locks has literally been forced into an opinion, whether they wanted to or not. The federal government has said, through the PWA, "now is the time to build if you are planning on building in the near future. We will finance and even give you nearly half of the money you need."

The city council in turn has put it up to the voters of the community to make the decision. This was the case in the water system and will be the case with the city hall. Let your convictions be your guide.
