SENATE PASSES BILL GIVING DAM \$2,425,000

Allotment of \$2,425,000 for Bonneville dam was virtually assured Monday when the senate passed the massive \$611,000,000 army supply bill previously passed by the house.

The bill was returned to the house for consideration of \$96,000,000 added by the senate for new items. Included are \$250,000 to finish the channel widening from Celilo to Walla Walla, and \$17,500 for removing obstructions and straightening the Columbia river from Vancouver to Bonneville.

BONNEVILLE IS THEME OF PORTLAND BOOKLET

Bonneville dam is the central theme of the annual report of the Portland chamber of commerce, Phil Thurman of the chamber of commerce announced Monday.

The report, in book form, will show the developments that have resulted and will result from construction of the dam and generation and distribution of power. The report will go to chamber members and industrial prospects for Portland. Fred H. Reese of the chamber plans to distribute them throughout the east. The books will appear about April 17.

ioned songs under an assumed name on the radio. His singing becomes extremely fashionable, but still he does not tell the family. He takes his aunt's car to dash to town for a broadcast, is arrested for stealing it and the denouement comes when the family arrives and discovers he is the famous "Fireside Troubadour." The mother-in-law is nonplussed and keeps her place thereafter.

A banker's daughter fell for Bert Wheeler, and rain falls for Robert Woolsey, in their new comedy feature, "The Rainmakers," most spectacular and most "circusy" of their many internationally-popular film extravaganzas, will be seen Sunday, Monday and Tuesday at the Roosevelt.

When Mother Nature fails to solve the problem of bean farmers facing ruin because of lack of rain, Wheeler and Woolsey, armed with a dizzy-looking machine, come to the rescue. They blunder into thunder, lope into love, race into rain, slide into snow, and skate into sleet, before they get the gadgets of their machine under control.

Dorothy Lee plays the banker's daughter. Many screen favorites support the hilarious pair. The climax comes with the wild, wooly and

laden locomotives which nearly blows Wheeler and Woolsey into the sky that they hope the rain will come from.

Carrying plenty of dynamite in its melodrama, relieving the tension created by its spooky atmosphere and spine-tingling thrills with lusty comedy and topping it all off with warm romance, "Seven Keys to Baldpate" is a perfectly balanced comedy. It will be seen Wednesday and Thursday.

Gene Raymond is cast in the leading role of this modern adaption of Earl Derr Biggers' famed novel of the same name, which has been changed somewhat to meet modern conditions. Raymond, as the celebrated novelist, chooses Baldpate inn as a quiet spot to work. He's fooled. Though he thinks he has the only key to the historic inn, six others click in the lock, all in search of \$200,000, a lot of money even with a 59-cent dollar. Raymond loses his heart to Margaret Raymond, one of the newcomers, and teams with her to get the money.
