RULES ANNOUNCED FOR LEGION FISHING DERBY

Fishermen of the dam area will compete for eight major prizes with a value of over \$200 in the fishing contest beginning April 5 sponsored by Bonneville post of the American Legion.

Charles Bellarts, contest chairman, issued the following rules: All dam employees and their families are eligible. Entry fee will be 25 cents and will enter the contestant in both the trout and salmon divisions.

All salmon must be caught between McCord creek and the Cascades at Cascade Locks. Trout can be taken from streams in Multnomah, Hood River and Clackamas counties, Oregon, and from Clark and Skamania counties in Washington. This limitation will give a better break to those unable to take long trips than they had in last year's contest, according to Bellarts.

All fish must be displayed for at least eight hours in the icebox near the community center. All judging will be done by Bellarts and his committee of Lee Summerville, Charles Shinn and Ernest Anderson. Full particulars and entry blanks may be obtained at Bonneville Men's store on the reservation.

Sid Phillips, Roosevelt theatre manager, will give a pair of tickets to the show to each winner, and Jack Gipson, Community Center barber, will give each winner a free haircut and shave. The contests will last three months from April 5, opening of the fishing season.

The FIDAC, 15 rue de Presles, Paris (15e), France.

Application should be accompanied by a copy of army discharge or a resume of service, including name, address, unit to which assigned during the war and dates of service, endorsed by the adjutant of an American Legion post.
