CCC'S BRING AID TO NEEDY RANCH HOME

Recent account of forest service CCC foreman Harry Fain's attempt to change frowning fortune for rancher Curry's family in the high mountain country near Index, Wn., reads like a "best seller", according to C. J. Conover of the Snoqualmie national forest.

While rancher Riley Curry was working on a WPA project near Index, a burning stick flew into his face and put out his eye. He was hurried to the hospital, leaving his wife at the lonely ranch cabin without fuel or feed for the cattle.

Mustering three CCC enrollees, foreman Fain provided fuel for the remote cabin, which can only be reached by cable across the north fork of the Skykomish river canyon. The tree troopers had later returned from Index with a truckload of hay and were taking several bales across the river on the suspension cable car when they heard cries of "fire" from the direction of the ranch. Dumping their hay cargo mid-stream and pulling the car to a quick landing, they arrived in time to see smoke pouring from the cabin windows and the distraught housewife frantically carrying water to put out the flames. The tree troopers helped save the house before great damage had been done.

Next they retrieved the jettisoned hay from the stream and have since repaired most of the fire damage. They are now hoping that Dame Fortune will smile once more on the ranch couple.
