URGES PUBLIC ACTION ON FOREST PROGRAM

The responsibility of all the people to safeguard the continued productivity of the forests was stressed by director Thornton T. Munger of the federal forest experiment station, Portland, before the Northwest Regional Planning Conference in Spokane February 14.

"The general public is becoming more conscious of the evil effects upon itself of the instability of forest ownership, of depleted supplies of forest products, the wastage of forest capital and the nonproductivity of forest acres," said Munger. "The public is realizing also that it is not within the power of private land owners to correct these abuses unassisted."

Public action to redeem its responsibilities toward forest welfare consists in making certain prohibitions and concessions to make permanence and economy in forest operation possible, stated Munger.

Chief among the proposed remedial measures discussed by the speaker were the acquisition of additional lands for public forests as recommended by the conference of lumbermen and foresters in Washington, D. C. in 1934; the extension of federal forest credits to make sustained yield forest management easier for private owners; changes in the taxation system by states to relieve pressure for immediate timber liquidation; management of all public lands on a sustained yield basis; promotion of research to assist forest owners and industrialists in applying the best scientific knowledge to their problems; and larger extension of federal participation in forest protection from fire, insects and disease. "We must recognize and make clear," said Munger, "that these forest problems are not problems for the forester and lumberman alone."

J. Freeman, operator of Columbia Construction company's big electric clamshell shovel 201, escaped unhurt last Thursday morning when the shovel overturned on top of the junior cofferdam.

The shovel's boom was twisted when it fell among a mass of intricate structural and reinforcing steel. The cab smashed a number of forms being made ready to pour concrete for the fishlock construction. Pouring of the sector was delayed until new forms could be made and the steel straightened or replaced.

Columbia hooked its main channel cableway onto the shovel shortly after the accident and succeeded in righting it by night. The accident was apparently caused when the shovel bit into bedrock or something equally solid, pulling it over on its side.

FRUTIGER TAKES OVER GALEN FANCHER'S BUS

control," said the speaker, "modified methods have been considered by recent legislatures, but no actual reforms enacted. This should be the first order of business in many forested states."

Munger pointed to recent advances made toward a more stable forest program. He cited the Fletcher bill now before Congress as offering valuable federal forest credit possibilities and the Fullmer bill passed in the last session as marking a step toward desirable acquisition of forest land by states with federal co-operation. Federal acquisition while substantially extended in the East during the past two years has not been active in the West where it was originally advocated to relieve the overburden on distressed private timber and promote sustained yield management. Recent legislation has placed Indian lands on a sustained yield basis similar to that of national forests, according to the U. S. experiment station director.
