Roaming the streets and highways of Washington in 460,000 cars are four desperate killers known as "Over Confidence," alias "Lack of Knowledge"; "Indifference," alias "Road Hog"; "Carelessness," alias "Selfishness"; "Speed Demon," alias "Ego-Maniac."

These four murderers killed 529 and injured 10,051 persons in the State of Washington during the year 1935. Every motorist is warned to be on guard against and to help apprehend these killers. Don't let them get into your car.

They get into a car uninvited and hypnotize an otherwise prudent and careful driver. They whisper: "Take a chance!" They urge: "You can beat the light!" They say: "Step on the gas!"
