

57 SEEK PRIZE IN BONNEVILLE MUSTACHE RACE

Fifty-seven upper lips are growing smudgier daily as the 57 entrants in the great Bonneville mustache derby strain their best to produce a respectable cookie-duster by April 30.

Entrance is still open to those who take the handicap of shaving the day of entry. They may file (or shave, rather) at French's barber shop on payment of 25 cents, proceeds going entirely to the winner.

Some pre-derby favorites, wearing mustaches for years, surprised themselves and others by the difference in facial expression when they came out from under the brush. Notable cases include Lieut. Bonny Whitsett of the U.S. guards, and Slim Hoggan.

Surprise to all is Marvin Hughes, slick-haired cook at French's, who is doing right well. But progress reports indicate that competition will be much keener for the consolation prize, donated by French's barber shop, than for the jackpot.

I. E. Burks refused to shave his upper lip but donated to the jackpot.

Opening day of the contest, April 4, was marked by the forced shaving of some entries who showed up at contest headquarters with fuzz on their lips. Others who had taken the precaution of shaving at home were responsible.

Earl Buell offered to bet he could shave dry for one gallon of beer, but after trying a quarter inch on his lip, retracted his statement.

UNION PACIFIC'S OREGON TAXES OVER A MILLION

A total of \$1,036,514.13 in taxes was levied in Oregon against the property of the Union Pacific railroad for 1935 and has been promptly paid, as in past years.

In Multnomah county, Union Pacific paid \$277,798 and in Hood River county, \$43,450.

In Baker, Umatilla, Union and Wasco counties, for example, the Union Pacific pays between 15 percent and 15 percent of each county's total tax levy. In Sherman county it pays more than 20 percent and, in Gilliam county, more than 23 percent of the total tax levy.
