EAGLES TO NOMINATE NEW OFFICERS APRIL 30

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General Nears Channel Job End

The contract of General-Shea for straightening the Columbia channel along the Washington shore west from the toll bridge was virtually completed Monday with exception of stone riprap.

General-Shea's job of taking the tip off Sheridan point, also on the Washington side but closer to the dam, is nearing completion. Equipment will be moved soon to Cascade Locks where a section of the island between the rapids and the lock will be smoothed off to improve current flow.

Work on the powerhouse is moving more rapidly than it has for several weeks and columns are now showing above the railroad deck across the downstream side. Monday night the 65-foot slab was poured and framing is going on up for the 77-foot deck and 65-foot walls. Pacific Coast Steel company is busy after a spell of inactivity throwing steel into columns between the 65- and 77-foot levels and on the west and east sides from 65 feet to the bottom of the crane beam at 96 feet, high structural point on the powerhouse.

Excavation on the Bradford island fishladder was begun in earnest this week. Diffusion chambers nine to 12 near the spillway dam are being excavated.

COLUMBIA SHUTS DOWN WORK ON NORTH CRIBS

spillway dam. The junior cofferdam, enclosing a large amount of construction on fishladders and elevators far below the river surface, is being built up from plus 27 to plus 45 feet to keep out the water. Seepage is coming in fast, but Columbia's pumps are throwing it out with success. A small timber crib is being built between pier 17 and pier A-2 to help keep the river back.

To date, 258,000 of the 280,000 yards of concrete have gone into the south half of the spillway. Piers 9 and 10 were poured to 56 feet this week, and piers 13 and 14 will be poured to 46 and 56 feet respectively next week.

Crib 28-A, last crib to go into the upstream side of the north cofferdam was hauled into position last Wednesday and was being sunk this week. Considerable difficulty is being experienced because of the strong current and a six or eight-foot gap between 28-A and the mid-channel cribs, caused by the current shoving the new cribs too tightly together. Strain on the cables during the placing of crib 28-A was computed by Columbia's engineers at 1,300,000 pounds. The three-inch wire cable anchoring the rigging barges to Boat rock was stretched so tightly during the operation that engineers, using surveyor's transits and other instruments could detect no sag whatever in its thousand or so feet of length.
